Level Crossing Campaign - John Russell

Parish councillors have voted to campaign for a footbridge at the Station Road level crossing. At a recent meeting with our MP and representatives of Network Rail the matter was raised by Barlaston First School Governors.

The number of trains passing through around the time school starts is always a problem but if there has been a hold-up on the line, delayed trains queue up and pass through at four minute intervals so the usual gaps are lost and pedestrians and drivers have to wait for four or five trains. Sitting in a car is bad enough but standing in the rain with no shelter is a terrible way for our children to arrive late for school.

The Parish Council has considered asking for a footbridge on the platforms before but it would dominate a beautiful part of the village and fears of vandalism caused members to vote against. It was also probable that ramps for disabled users instead of steps would make the structure longer than the platform.

The status of both our village stations is also a problem. They have not been officially closed and, in theory, could be brought back into use for a local service. However



if a footbridge was built on the platforms they could never be reopened for passenger use.

The only alternative, considered back in 1990, was to petition for a completely new by-pass road and a rail-bridge from the field by the canal up to the field below the Church. That was a tall order when they spent £9Bn on the upgrade in 1997. In today's austerity a £3M project seems even more unlikely.



Barlaston Village Hall - Gareth Jones

The Annual General Meeting of the Village Hall Management Committee was held on Thursday 30th May. Councillor Steve Hall was in the Chair. It was reported that whilst the Hall had generated a very modest surplus in 2012/13 there had been very significant expenditure (£9k) on maintenance, refurbishment and the upgrading of facilities.

Included in this category was the provision of a new backstage curtain and a new sound system. The

programme to improve the insulation of the Hall had been completed and the benefit from this programme was being realised through lower utility bills. There had been expenditure on painting and decorating, floor repairs and repairs to the drainage system. The Hall Management Committee had received £3k in grants to support some of this activity.

The Management Committee had placed orders to upgrade the electricity supply and to improve the ventilation in the current year and it was also engaged in looking at way to enhance the kitchen facilities. Discussions are also ongoing with the County Council to make good the damage to the forecourt caused by the library van.

The Samaritans - Local Samaritans Volunteer

Samaritans notices recently appeared at our level crossings because of the tragic loss of several individuals. As a Samaritans volunteer and Barlaston resident, I have obviously been very concerned about those events.

The word Samaritans conveys thoughts of death by suicide, something that we often find difficult to talk about.

Whilst the primary aim of Samaritans is indeed to help reduce the number of deaths by suicide, Samaritans volunteers listen confidentially to a n y o n e whose circumstances result in emotional distress.

In any life, difficulties and pain are likely at some stage, whether through bereavement, job loss, work pressures, financial difficulties, loneliness, bullying, exams, physical or mental health, etc.

Sometimes, it may feel like more than our fair share and, for whatever reason, we may experience difficulties in finding - or even seeking - support.

At such times, that support may come from Samaritans whose volunteers are people from within our communities not unlike our First Responders — who are trained to listen unconditionally in such a way that callers may find their own way forward.

Today, our callers are not limited to the telephone or face-to-face meetings at our local branch. Email and text are also available for

those who prefer written communication.

In my experience, there has never been anything so rewarding as giving a little of my time and attention to someone in crisis. The thorough training has taken care of any apprehension about being able to cope. It is also good to be part of such a friendly, vibrant and diverse network of people. And I realise how fortunate I am too.



Planning

The review of planning applications continues to be an important function for the Parish Council.

During the last Council year 29 planning applications were reviewed and where appropriate comments were made to be brought to the attention of the Stafford Borough Planning and Regeneration Department. However the liberalisation of the national guidelines governing planning regulations has caused some difficulties resulting in several applications that were opposed at local level being approved by the Borough Council.

Despite these setbacks the Parish Council is

committed to do all that it can to protect the Green Belt and also to preserve the essential character of the village.

There have been concerns raised at the Open Forums prior to Parish Council meetings about the need to protect the many fine trees in the village and also the need to sensitively managed open areas. This is a matter that the Parish Council takes very seriously.

There are two very significant challenges facing the village. The former Wedgwood Memorial College remains empty and is up for sale. The Parish Council has had a preliminary meeting with

Stafford Borough Council planners to consider a design statement for the site involving some residential development and it is expected that this will be progressed in the year.

Further, a planning application for the residential development of part of the WWRD site has been lodged with Stoke City Council. This application is consistent with the proposal that was consulted upon in 2012 but it is clear that if it is progressed it will have a major impact on village life.

The basic issues at stake are clear. It is felt that most villagers would support an initiative that seeks to underpin employment locally in a traditional industry but the proposed residential development is in land designated within the Green Belt. It is anomalous that the Planning authority that will consider this development is the City whilst the impact of the residential development will fall on Barlaston and Stafford Borough Council.

What will be the consequences of this development locally for our school, our Health Centre and our roads. The Parish Council is committed to monitor the developing situation very closely.

The Samaritans and Network Rail Training Day - Viv O'Dunne

On average, one person per day tries to take their own life on the UK's railways. In 2010 The Samaritans and Network Rail formed a partnership to try to reduce railway suicides by 20% over a five period. (source: http://tinyurl.com/d9cqtlp)

The Partnership deliver a bespoke training course to staff that then gives them the skills and confidence to identify and approach a distressed/suicidal person, to give emotional first aid and a successful referral to The Samaritans.

It was mooted at a public

meeting in March that the training course could be extended to Barlaston residents; on the 13th June Barlaston became the first community group to be given the training in the Village Hall.

was tasked with organising the day and faced the difficulty of how to advertise the course without sensitively, attracting any media attention.

As places were limited, I worked alongside a local Samaritans volunteer to target specific groups and individuals who were most

likely to encounter vulnerable people in our community.

On the day 17 individuals from a real cross-section took part in the day long course. The Samaritans trainer, Steve Tollerton, delivered an informative well-structured programme and we were educated in barriers to listening, health, emotional bereavement and loss, appropriate responses, signs of suicidal intent and we learned how approach distressed а person using the 6 stages of the listening wheel. The day culminated in how to

make a referral to The Samaritans.

Steve said after the course "It was a privilege working with a community group so dedicated to making a difference". He thanked Elaine Shaw, one of the Barlaston CFR's, for the provision and preparation of a delicious buffet lunch for everyone, and to Steve Green at the Londis for donating our water and snacks.

My experience of the day was best summarised by feedback from an attendee who said "It was a wonderful experience to be there and to feel part of such a caring community. Barlaston is not just a pretty village".
