I am very pleased to introduce this latest Autumn 2018 edition of the Heron. The Heron was the brainchild of Peter Nichols, a former Parish Council Chairman, who unfortunately recently died. A tribute to Peter is contained elsewhere.

The publication of the Heron gives the Parish Council an opportunity to highlight matters that are thought to

be of interest to the Village as a whole.

The powers of the Parish Council are quite limited but it can exert pressure on behalf of the residents and it is thought that the Council is being quite effective in this regard.

Most villagers seem to be very content with the changes that have occurred recently with the Health Centre arrangements; there has been a significant improvement/reduction in the incidence of dog fouling; and the speed watch team have made an impact

throughout the village. Footpaths around the village are in reasonably good condition. Whilst there have been teething difficulties, the mowing contractors have generally done a good job.

However, a major matter of current concern remains the parking difficulties in Orchard Place. The area is owned by Stafford and Rural Homes and whilst they state that they are fully aware of the problem they are limited in their powers to control the situation.

Discussions are ongoing with SARH in an attempt to find a more acceptable resolution to the difficulties.

An underlying matter of concern is the savings that Staffordshire County Council are considering and the impact on the village, particularly in respect of Highways. The County Council undertakes grass cutting, gulley clearance, pothole repair, tree and

pavement maintenance. It would seem that there is an expectation from the County Council that Parish Councils will take responsibility for some or all of these activities, either by organising teams of volunteers or by increasing the precept.

The Village does benefit greatly from the voluntary activity of the Community Group with particular reference to litter picking and the care and attention given to the planters by an individual. The Parish Council is giving consideration to the appointment of lengthsmen to undertake minor road

maintenance work. If it is decided to proceed, this activity would be paid for out of existing resources.

Barlaston is a very pleasant place to live, property within the village is generally much sought after and the village currently presents itself well. It is thought that the majority of villagers would wish to maintain that position. In future this might only be achieved through the use of additional voluntary time or increases in precept. We need to debate these matters.

'Lest we forget.' This refrain from a Kipling poem written before the turn of the century, yet appropriate as a plea for remembrance of lives lost in the horrors of world war, is a cry which has haunted the souls of generations of compassionate humanity ever since, For us in Barlaston those lost lives are listed on pg. 2.



In the silence of remembering them each November, we hold them in our hearts and remember them and we give thanks, a powerful sense of *community-now* reaching back to courageous *community-then*, feeling the terror of what was required of those young men; the tears and the anguish of Mothers and Fathers, wives and lovers over those who died, those maimed, those scarred physically, mentally, emotionally.

Wishing to harness strong feeling in our village to make this hundredth anniversary of the Armistice very special, community leaders (our vicar, the Revd Canon Stewart Jones, our school Head Teacher, Mandy Clarey and our Borough Council & Parish Council Chair, Gareth Jones) looked at ways of working together to achieve this.

The children of Barlaston 1st have been preparing songs and poetry to perform in the

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church (after the service on The Green) and artwork to go on display there.

The church / community group started with research on where each soldier, sailor or airman lived. Appeals to older Barlastonians for family-held memories proved very fruitful and the oral history has been one of the most enjoyable aspects of the process, fostering a sense of community-that-cares-about-its people-past, as we chat over coffee or lunch. Service booklets on the day will appreciate such contributions more fully.

The process of gathering more extensive information: online photos and transcripts of documents (birth/marriage/death certificates; censuses; bills; wills) has been fascinating and deeply involving and it has been a privilege to work alongside experienced researchers (thanks to Gill Brealey, Jenny Latham and local historian, Tim Cockin). Flight Sergeant David Nutt has been an invaluable source for military research as well as a salutary reminder that service-people today are *still* on active service. Findings will be on display at the Church on November 11th alongside the work of children and young people.

The Parish Council is planning to host an event of Remembrance at the Village Hall on Saturday 10th November between 14:30 & 18:00 Refreshments will be served, music of the time will be played and there will be readings of some of the poetry and prose. It is expected that demand for tickets will outstrip supply.

The Royal British Legion has called on the nation to unite in commemorating Remembrance Sunday 2018. Their call is to Whitehall, ours is to the War Memorial on the village green at 10:40 on November 11th. As there is no service in church beforehand there will be seating for the disabled/elderly/frail on the green.

At the going down of the sun and in the morning, we will remember them (Laurence Binyon, 1914)

Farewell to our old friend, Peter...

It was standing room only in the Parish Church of St. John the Baptist earlier in September when family and friends of our former Parish Council Chairman, Peter Nichols, gathered to pay their last respects.

Peter served on the Parish Council and became Chairman, being remembered for his election which was taken to the High Court after hundreds of votes were lost in the count. He presented the Chairman's Gavel which is still used today at our meetings.

Amongst many other things, Peter was Chairman of our Scouts and Guides, President of the

Boys Brigade, Church Sidesman, Chairman of the Mens' Society. He was the organiser of the first Village Fair in 1992 and awarded the Golden Jubilee Award for services to our community.

Peter was also well known for his love of sport, as both an observer and a player: league basketball, cricket and rugby union and latterly crown green bowls. He played principally at the Plume of Feathers Bowling Club where he held the offices of President, Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer and was Captain of four successful teams.

Peter passed away on the 21st August, aged 81 years. Despite long-term health problems Peter, with the care and support of his loving wife, Janet, lived a full and active life. Peter felt that the more you put into something the more you got out, no more so than in Barlaston; he certainly did that, and we were very lucky to have him. *Cllr. Viv O'Dunne*



Community Speedwatch

In May this year new parish councillor, David Norman, received great support from a team of a dozen local volunteers in forming a new Speedwatch

Group. After initial training they've maintained 2 x I-hour sessions weekly across a number of police-approved sites throughout the village. Hopefully, you've seen them "out and about" in their highvis jackets!

some social IT'S 3 FOR A As well as enjoying conversation in their small groups of 3, the roadside volunteers record the details **REASON** of any vehicles travelling at 35mph or

more – in a 30mph zone. These are shared with the all Police who issue an "advisory" letter to those drivers. An "escalated" letter is issued for a 2^{nd} occurrence. A 3rd is likely to result in a home visit by the Police.

catching speeding vehicles. It's about taking an

interest in everyone's personal safety - young and old, whether on foot, on a bike or as a motorist.

A pedestrian hit at 30mph has a very significant l in 5 chance of being killed. This rises to a 1 in 3 chance if they are hit at 35mph.

Statistics to 18th September showed 572 vehicles reported, of which 438 were at 40mph or more - the highest was 58mph! I nterestingly, 20% of the total were from ST12 Postcode with a further 27% from adjoining ST3 and ST4. So, it's not just outsiders "racing through the village"!

By the end of the year it is hoped that the personal safety message will be reinforced by permanent Community Speedwatch Area signs at

entrances to the village. Illuminated Speed Indication Display signs are also being considered for a couple of specific hotspots.

Dog Fouling Free Campaign 2018

A successful Dog Fouling Free Campaign ran from December to June. The scheme was monitored by Stafford Borough Council (SBC). During this period the concentration was on the canal towpath from Wedgwood bridge to the bridge leading to Meaford Road.

Last December this walk was in a terrible state and many residents were complaining. However, with posters and new bins, by April we were 90% free from dog fouling as compared to the original survey. An amazing achievement by our proud dog owners. Unfortunately, the hot summer weather also bought many visitors who didn't fully appreciate our aim and the percentage has dropped a little to 87%. Still a remarkable achievement (the average is 37% free nationally) So we really did do well. Many thanks to all who helped to achieve this!

SBC have agreed to help us with one more 6month monitoring period, this time at Barlaston Park (A Facebook poll saw the Park get 62% of

votes with the Cricket Club getting 38%). SBC Enforcement officer, Saul Hocking, has agreed to attend later in the year to do an initial assessment of Barlaston Park. It is hoped that we can give some support to the Cricket Club to deal with their dog fouling problem, too.

Environmental Volunteers Wanted!

Cllr Chris Hurst has been appointed to oversee Environmental Projects within Barlaston, he is currently working closely with Staffordshire Wildlife Trust looking at rejuvenating the Wildlife Area which lies on the opposite side of Station Road and adjacent to the entrance of the car park. An interesting feature here is the presence of five old pear trees which, along with the Damson in the hedge, suggests the previous existence of an old orchard or their proximity to one. This is a rare find today and valued for the associated invertebrate fauna, the Heathers and Lavender planted are good food sources for insects.

With some careful improvements it could improve its value for wildlife. The existing fruits, berries and seeds already attract some birds, but this could be widened further by the introduction of some wetland species like Guelder-rose and Bird Cherry which could be accommodated by a little thinning of the planted non-native Alders. Likewise, the ground flora here could be improved to attract dragonflies, damselflies, and other invertebrates by planting wet-loving, native wildflowers. The 'massed' Rowans could be judiciously thinned to allow trees to develop to maturity and further specimen fruit trees planted to increase the amount of spring blossom for foraging insects.

Chris recently worked with the school children enabling them to participate in the 'Open Gardens' event, since then they have received a donated green house and are eager to start growing plants ready for inclusion in the wildlife area, promoting the next generation of eco-warriors.

We have signed a new commitment to the Canal & River Trust to start work along the stretch of canal running through Barlaston. The first project will be to re-set the stone which has recently been disturbed, followed by hedge trimming and ground works to eradicate water logged holes over the winter.

Health Centre News

For those who are not already aware, on 6th August Brinsley Avenue Practice opened a branch surgery in Barlaston after Cumberland House (the previous practice) withdrew from the site.

We would like to start by thanking the residents of Barlaston for their support over the last few weeks whilst we have settled in at Barlaston. The practice has registered over 1150 patients, the majority of whom were registered in the first few weeks of opening. Without exception, everyone has made us feel so welcome and have been very patient with us whilst we have registered them. We have already received some lovely feedback about our clinical and administrative team, which is lovely to hear.

We would like to encourage everyone who has not already done so to register. There is no closure date for registration or a deadline. We had our new phone system installed a few weeks ago and, whilst there have been a few initial teething problems, things are starting to settle. The old number for Barlaston Health Centre no longer links to us and will direct

you to Cumberland House. The main Practice number is 01782 657199.

Our GP team is headed up by our Senior Partner Dr V H Hendley and our other GP Partner Dr M The rest of our GP team include Dr C Webb. Anderson, Dr D Bridgwood, Dr R Jolley and Dr M Mascarenhas. The nursing team is headed up by Sr. Dena Corden-LePetit who is an Advanced Nurse Practitioner. The team comprises of Practice Nurses -Sr. Sarah Winstanley and Sr. Janey Pusey and Health Care Assistant – Angela Carter. The reception and administration team includes: Aimee, Debra, Claire, Chris, Georgia, Rachel and is overseen on a daily basis by Sue our reception supervisor. The overall Management of the practice is handled by Helen Derbyshire – Practice Business Manager.

We are planning to make improvements to the infrastructure at Barlaston Health Centre and this is being progressed.

We look forward to welcoming you to the practice.



Volunteers Car Scheme

The scheme operates for Barlaston and Barlaston Park residents only. The scheme provided 254 trips in the last financial year. So far this year, we have achieved 121 trips, 23 above this time last year. The scheme goes from strength to strength.

Our drivers take residents to doctors, dentists, opticians, hospital, even hair appointments and shopping. Some residents may be unable to drive for a short time after operations and find this service useful.

This year we would like to say a big thank you for the financial support from: The Methodist Hall Coffee Morning raffle, Barlaston Hall Yellow Book Open Garden weekend and Barlaston Afternoon WI. The scheme was thankful to receive a grant from the Silver

Fund obtained through Stafford Borough Council These funds have allowed us to cover telephone costs, public liability insurance costs and print literature to promote what we do. We have a large marketing sign and even t-shirts.

Our drivers, treasurer, co-ordinator and chair meet regularly and have undergone training in first aid and carry a first aid kit in each car. We have 14 drivers who volunteer their time. The co-ordinator is the key operator to match passenger requests and drivers. Rose Kingsbury is our co-ordinator who keeps us on the move. The Parish Council continues to support the group and reports are given regularly.




